# LINE-UP TRAINING

## Pedestrian Stops / Unknown Risk Stops

### I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this training is to familiarize sworn staff with the SDSO procedures for conducting pedestrian contacts.

### II. DISCUSSION

Staff shall discuss and review procedures related to "Pedestrian Stop/Unknown Risk Stop" incidents:

As Deputy Sheriff's assigned to the Detention Services Bureau, you may be called upon to make law-enforcement contacts in and around your respective facilities.

From an officer safety standpoint, you should approach every contact with officer safety in mind. You should also strive to maintain a constant state of readiness.

- Location of proposed contact
- Person(s) demeanor
- Prior knowledge of the person

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### C. OFFICER SAFETY CONCERNS

- 1. F.I. Stance
- 2. Be aware of surroundings, including available cover / concealment.
- Keep gun hand free.
- Watch suspect's hands.
- D. WHEN MAKING PEDESTRIAN CONTACTS, DEPUTIES SHOULD CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING



An emergency situation is not the time to discover that your equipment is missing or not functioning properly.

### E. CONSENSUAL CONTACT VS. DETENTION

- 1. Consensual Contact
  - Reasonable person
  - b. They are free to leave at any time
- 2. Detention
  - a. Not free to leave
  - b. Lawful detention requires reasonable suspicion that the individual recently committed a crime, is in the process of committing a crime, or is soon going to commit a crime.
