



Interstate Parolees

When an incarcerated individual is released from prison on parole in another state, they may petition the Parole Board to be allowed to reside in California. If the conditions for this are met, the incarcerated individual can serve their parole in California, under the supervision of California State Parole. If the parolee commits a crime while here on parole, they may have a hold placed. This allows California to return the offending parolee to their state of origin, per California Penal Code Section 11177.1 "The Compact Agreement on Interstate Parolees." Interstate Parolees are identified by their CDC numbers. A CDC number is issued by the California Department of Corrections and Rehabilitation when an incarcerated individual serves time in state prison. It is a letter followed by 5 numbers. An Interstate parolee's number will always start with an "I".

When an Interstate Parolee is brought into Sheriff's custody, the DPT will use the following procedures:

BOOKED STATE PAROLE

- Type of arrest will be **BSTP** - Booked State Parole
- Charge Code is **11177.1 PC**
- Bill Agency is **STPA**

NOTE: Interstate Parolees are identified by their CDC number beginning with the letter I.

The Sheriff's Extraditions Unit is responsible for tracking these incarcerated individuals. They will schedule the incarcerated individuals for the revocation hearings and notify the detention facility of the scheduled date, time and location.

After the hearing the Extraditions Unit will notify IPD staff of the scheduled pick update.

NOTE: Do not confuse these with an Interstate Agreement Detainer.
