Common Disposition Types:

- DISM: Dismissed
- ROR: Released on Own Recognize
- BOND: When someone posts bail
- CASH: When someone posts bail in cash
- CTS: Credit for Time Served. Utilized when someone has completed a sentence.
- PROB: Probation
- 825: No Complaint Filed
- NCDA: NO Complaint District Attorney
- B(1): Detention Only. Used when the AO, District Attorney, or City Attorney determines that there are insufficient grounds for making a criminal complaint against the person arrested.
- B(2): No Further Proceedings 849b(2). Used for inmates arrested for 647(F) & no prosecution is desired.
- CB&R: Court Book & Release
- CFLR: County Flash Completed.
- NINA: ICE Notification
- LPSC: Local Prison Sentence Complete
- SPTS: Supervised PTS Release. When Pre-Trial services grants an O.R. to an inmate but requires the inmate to be under their supervision.
